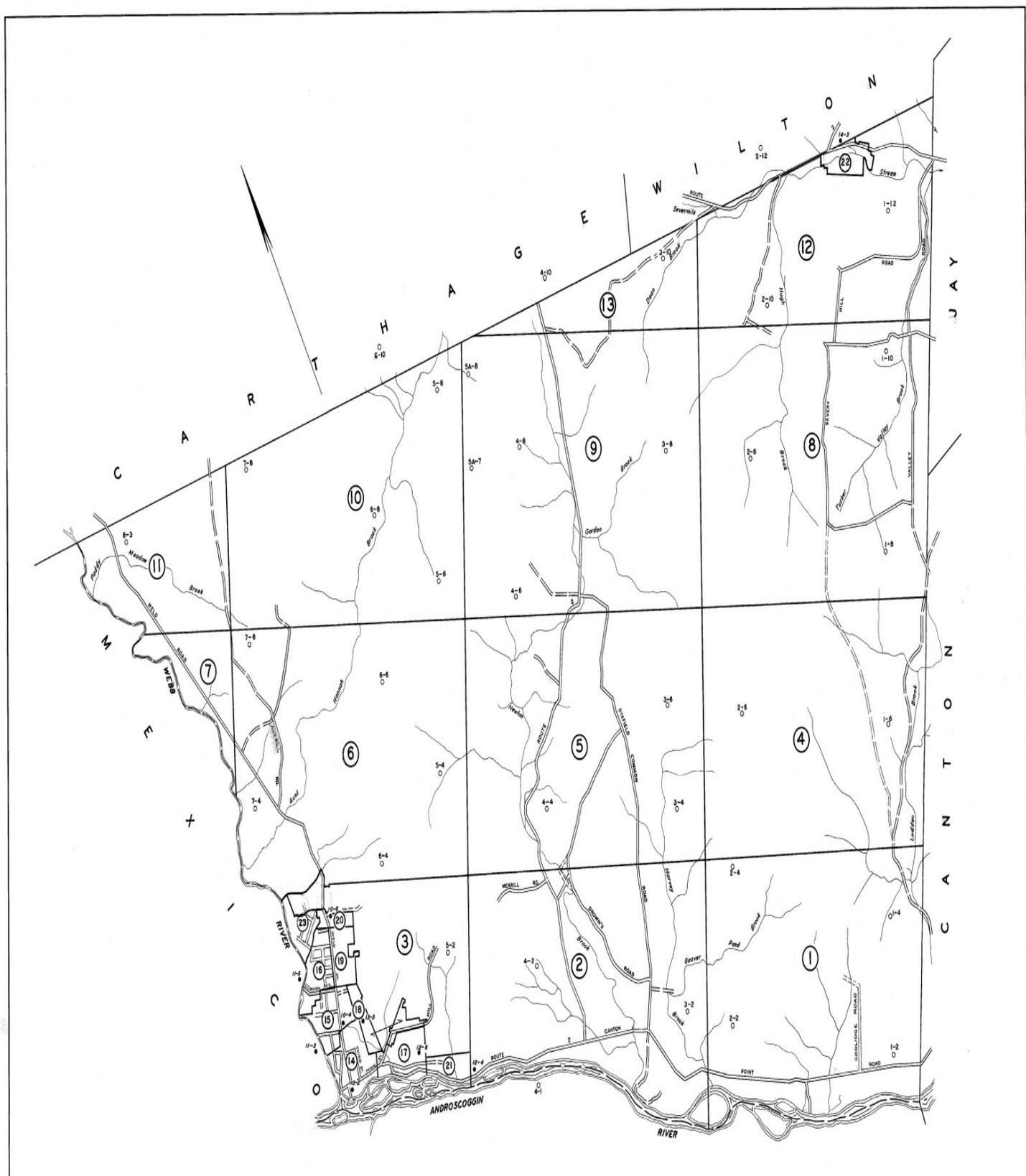

Boston Post Cane Recipient

In August, 1909, Boston Post Canes were forwarded to the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to over 600 cities and towns in Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island. The cane is made of ebony wood from the Congo, Africa and finished in the finest quality French varnish. The gold in the head of the cane is of 14 carat fineness. It was originally intended that the cane be presented by the Municipal Officials of each community to the oldest, living male resident. Today, we also honor the oldest, living female resident and present our oldest, living citizen with a Boston Post Cane plaque. This year's recipient of the Dixfield Boston Post Cane is Fred Weld, 95 years old.

It is with pleasure that I submit, for your consideration, the report for municipal activities for the year ending June 30, 2015.

It is the desire of this office and all reporting departments that the brief explanations of various functions and services provided would help you to better understand and evaluate their operations.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectpersons, all the municipal employees, and the citizens of Dixfield for the support and confidence expressed to me as I complete my first full year as your Town Manager.

I would also like to express my sincerest appreciation for all those that choose to serve this community on boards, committees, commissions, or in other positions to improve or guide your local government.

The Board of Selectpersons and I continue to work diligently with the Department Heads to better understand our operations in order to not jeopardize the services we feel are necessary and want to ensure this community is safe and well maintained while still watching our bottom line.

It is our goal to provide the citizens with the best services possible while keeping the property taxes at an affordable rate.

We all share a common goal: to make the Town of Dixfield the best it can be. Although we may stand on different sides of an issue, we must stand together in order to achieve this goal.

The town ended the year in a strong financial position with a Fund Balance of \$1,009,084. Total Governmental Funds as of June 30, 2015 was \$3,576,399.

Municipal services account for 43.22% of the taxes, education costs equal 53.50%, and county taxes are 3.28% of the total.

Finally, I greatly appreciate those citizens who are willing to take the time to ask questions and discuss their concerns with me.

Emergency Management Director Report

Dixfield Emergency Management Annual Report for fiscal year 2014-2015

This year, our area experienced a record breaking winter with extremely cold temperatures and large snow fall events. Our town crews stayed on top of it and services were not interrupted for any period of time. As a result of the burden placed on local and state resources by this brutal winter, we addressed the possibility of federal emergency relief. This resulted in a total review of the national snow policy for requesting federal assistance and the new state emergency management staff is working with F.E.M.A. to rehab the federal snow policy. The Maine Emergency Management Agencies staffing vacancies have been filled and the new staff is settling into their positions.

There were no significant spring flooding events and no severe summer storms during this reporting period.

I attended quarterly meetings with Oxford county Emergency Management to remain apprised of training opportunities and state events. Our training schedule was passive this year.

I have had an overwhelming show of support, even in the trying times we have experienced and will continue to do my best to serve you well.

Next, I wish to bid a heartfelt "Fare Thee Well" to former Chief Richard Pickett, a true mentor and leader. Chief Pickett prepared me well for this position and has always expressed his offering of guidance and support. He still, and always will, have the interest of the Town of Dixfield at heart. Richard Pickett is and will always be known as a man with a long and distinguished career in law enforcement and always dedicated to family and friends and to his peers. I wish him all the best.

I would also be remiss if I did not extend my gratitude to the never ending support and tireless hours of work provided by our officers. A tremendous "Thank You" to Officer Eric Bernier for the tireless work he does as and excellent Evidence Tech, to Officer Anne Edmunds for her work in Operation Sunshine, and to Officer Dustin Broughton for his work with the kids in our schools. The thank you also extends to all of the reserve officers that help to cover the open shifts and extra details that are so vital in keeping a small department operating as smoothly as possible.

The Dixfield PD once again applied for and was awarded several grants. Grants received were Underage Drinking, Bureau of Highway Safety Seat Belt Enforcement, Impaired Driving Enforcement, and Local Pass-Through Act-Bryne Jag. We were able to use the grant monies to fund special details in problematic areas of our community. These details included increased patrols for impaired drivers as we strive to make our roads safe for all. We conducted extra saturation patrols to crack down on seatbelt and speed violations throughout our community. We were able to purchase other much needed equipment that otherwise would not have been possible.

Our fifth officer position received through our COPS Grant continued to provide the department with the opportunity to have an officer in both of our schools on a regular basis as well as providing the additional time and manpower to follow up on criminal investigations in a timely manner. As you can see by the statistics the position has proven to be very instrumental in the successful investigation and solving of major crimes during this past year. The grant will end on February 28, 2015. It will then be our obligation to keep the officer on board for one year after coming back to a full roster. With the prolonged opening in the department we will now have Officer Broughton with us until August 2016. This extra position has been instrumental in our ability to work on the increasing number of criminal complaints that have started early this past calendar year, and we hope you will agree that funding this position in the future will be a critical step in helping to keep Dixfield "The Way Life Should Be".

We have a Facebook account on which we encourage you to sign on as a friend and report any and all criminal or suspicious activity you observe in our community. You may also report through our office, in person, by telephone (562-4517) or through the Oxford County Regional Communication Center (800-733-1421). Anonymous tips are welcomed. Please do not hesitate to call and be assured that we will work with you and follow up on all information received.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015, the Fire Company responded to the following seventy-eight (78) incidents:

More than one half of these calls, 46, involved mutual aid, either received or provided. As noted in previous years, mutual aid is critical today in our response to emergency incidents, not only in Dixfield, but also our surrounding communities. With more members working out of town, multiple jobs, and shift work, each town sees diminished response numbers at any given time.

We encourage all citizens to check for and remedy any fire hazards in and around your home; please make sure you have working smoke detectors (and replace the batteries when you change your clocks); if you burn wood, please inspect and clean your chimney (we have chimney cleaning brushes available for loan at the station); keep flammables, matches & lighters away from young children.

While outdoor cooking or warming fires do not require a permit, any burning of brush or leaves does require a permit. Fire permits are available from the Town Fire Warden or Deputies (names & numbers available at the Town Office), or online at www.maineburnpermit.com.

Again, I would like to thank the members that have been able to assist with Fire Prevention presentations made in our area schools. These presentations are an important step to developing safe habits handling fire and recognizing hazards. We also encourage citizens to be safe when using fireworks—know the laws; if you have any questions please contact us at the station.

Thank you to our personnel for putting many hours of training, working around the station, and especially responding to calls. We extend our gratefulness to all of our surrounding fire department partners, the Auxiliary, the Dixfield Police and Public Works Departments and MedCare Ambulance. Their assistance is essential to providing a safe response and outcome to our varied calls throughout the year. Finally, thanks to the citizens for providing the equipment necessary to fulfill our mission.

Please, practice fire safety every day.

Water Department

To the Citizens of Dixfield:

2015 was the second year of our three year contract between Mexico Water District and the Town of Dixfield for the Water Department Field Operations. It also was the second year the Town of Dixfield contracted with Mexico Water District to provide billing and collection services for the Sewer and Water Departments.

For the year 2015 we pumped over 39,980,000 gallons of drinking water.

During the 2015 year, besides the normal work load, we did the following:

- 1) Oversaw the Pine Street & High Street Water Main Replacement Project.
- 2) Assisted in the Howard Street Main Replacement.
- 3) Started the Newton Brook Pumping Station upgrades.
- 4) Finished Phase 3 of the Plant Controls & Alarm Systems upgrades.
- 5) Corrected Curb Box issues at the end of Robbins Avenue.
- 6) We are still working on updating the records for Curb Box shut-offs, to date we have completed 505 out of 600.

Our Meter Replacement Program is in our seventh year, so far we have replaced over 65 meters this year giving us a total of over 475 meter changes since we started in 2006.

We look forward to another great year working for the Town of Dixfield.

In an effort to prolong the life of the sewer infrastructure, maintain Maine DEP compliance, and US EPA Clean Water Act compliance, eliminate sewer overflows or discharges, maintain compliance with town liability insurance requirements, and respond to issues effectively, the Town of Dixfield is contracted with the Ted Berry Company of Livermore to operate and maintain the wastewater collection system. This agreement began on September 1, 2007 when the Ted Berry Company took over the daily operations of the wastewater collection system for the Town.

The Town's sewer system consists of nearly 8.5 miles of underground gravity sewer pipe, approximately 150 manholes, a service connection for each private sewer lateral that connects to the sewer system, and seven pumping stations which lift the flow from areas throughout the system and pump it to Hall Hill where it is metered and pumped one last time to the Rumford/Mexico Sewerage Treatment plant through a long force main which the Town shares with the Mexico Sewer District.

As part of the maintenance agreement annual collection system cleaning and inspections including the sewer mains and the pumping stations is ongoing, if you experience any abnormalities in the sewer system or at your house contact our collection system operator who can check the main sewer and make sure it is operating correctly.

The aging pumping stations require constant attention; and many upgrades have been made in recent years to prolong the life of the systems and increase reliability. These upgrades included mechanical upgrades like new pumps, piping, and telemetry systems in many of the stations as well as a strategic condition assessment that was performed in the main Hall Hill Pumping station in 2015 by the Ted Berry Company and its engineer AE Hodsdon.

Some of the ways residents and users of the sewer system can help protect the infrastructure and keep operating expenses down are to never flush FOG (Fats, Oils, and/or Grease) down the drains, do not flush so called "flushable" wipes into the sewer system as they are in most cases non-dispersible which means they stay intact and can clog pipes and pumps, and report anything that seems abnormal with the sewer system immediately. Sewer pipes and pumping stations can become clogged by FOG and wipes or other debris not intended for the sewer system and cause backups into basements, roadways, businesses, and waterways, Sewer backups create health hazards and can result in expensive property damage and threaten the environment.

Paul Pomerleau, a 20yr veteran of the Ted Berry Company has daily responsibility of the town sewer system and works under direction of Matt Timberlake, a NEWEA Grade IV Collection System Operator and NASSCO certified pipeline inspector. Paul has operated the Dixfield sewer system since 2007.



Ludden Memorial Library

This past year has brought some changes to our library. We welcome Loretta Blancato, (or as the children call her, Miss Loretta) as our new Story Time coordinator. She is a very fine addition to our staff and does a wonderful job with the children who already adore her! Miss Loretta fits in well with the library and the library's patrons. We are all happy to have her join us!

Also new this year, we are taking part in a unique program called "Books on Wheels" which is funded by a private grant through SeniorsPlus' "Meals on Wheels" in Oxford County. The program enables homebound consumers to be able to enjoy library materials without leaving their homes. The items are picked up and returned to the library by the same "Meals on Wheels" delivery people. This seems to be working well for everyone involved.

The library continues to adapt and restructure in this digital world of ever increasing technology. According to the Bangor Daily News, **"28 percent of adults read an e-book in 2013, up from 23 percent in 2012 and there is a clear need for their (the library's) role as a gathering space."** Ludden library provides these things, as a meeting place for many public and private functions, plus we offer over 7,500 of the latest downloadable books, and we have nearly 5,000 downloadable audio books for children, teens, and adults. These books may be downloaded to any digital device for free with your library card. Of course we also offer over 20,000 print materials, approximately 1,000 physical audio books on CD, and approximately 2,000 video DVDs. We also subscribe to 34 print serials which are available to check out as well. Our patrons also have access to 66 licensed databases which can be used for research, etc. at the library, at home, or anywhere that you have an internet connection. We also offer public WiFi as well.

In addition, we also provide interlibrary loans to other Minerva libraries and receive interlibrary loans from those libraries as well. "If we don't have it, we can get it," is our motto.

We have circulated 6,681 children's materials and 16,755 adult materials, plus approximately 1,000 electronic materials over this past year. Our 10 public use computers are also well used with over 4,000 sessions this year. We have had over 16,000 library visits and assisted patrons with 697 reference questions. There have been 41 children's programs offered this year, which have been well attended with close to 1,000 participants. Also, for adults we hosted "The Blue Lights and Funny Cider Tour" with visiting Maine authors John Ford, Sr. and Mark Nickerson. Ford is a former Maine Game Warden; Nickerson is a former Maine State Trooper. Both are authors of their own books. This program was very interesting and enjoyable for all those in attendance.

The library was operated with a municipal appropriated budget of \$135,073 for the FY 2014-15. We have collected revenues consisting of non-resident fees, fines, print and copy fees, etc. of \$5,458.

The library also uses social media to keep in touch with our patrons & friends. You can find us on Facebook and follow us on Twitter to see what we've been up to, or you can stop in anytime during our business hours to visit!

This library serves the towns of Dixfield, Canton, Carthage, and Peru with nearly 1400 registered users.

Hours of operation are: Monday through Friday 9:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. We are also open on Saturdays at 9:00 a.m. until Noon from Labor Day until Memorial Day, the library is closed on Saturdays during the summer.

Northern Oxford Regional Solid Waste Board (N.O.R.S.W.B.)

Greetings, Town of Dixfield Residents:

Recycling market revenues decreased some \$9,150 due to less demand for materials globally. Revenues received did, however, cover the costs of our recycling operations. In addition, we were able to complete various improvements at the transfer station/recycling center including completion of paving the facility.

Year 2014 saw an improvement in processed tons of municipal solid waste from our six member towns totaling 9633 tons versus 9080 in 2013. Disposal cost in 2014 (excluding transportation) was \$486,305. Recycled material was 938 tons in 2014 which gave us total revenues of \$102,641. Tonnage was down from the 965 ton figure in 2013.

Please remember separating recyclables from trash decreases the cost of disposal and creates a revenue stream. An average person's trash is made up of 50% recyclables, while only 10% is currently being recycled.

Recyclable materials include aluminum and metal cans, newsprint, magazines, office paper and junk mail, as well as, any cardboard and paperboard such as cereal containers, shoe boxes, egg cartons, etc. Plastic recycling has expanded to include all containers, excluding plastic bags, which most supermarkets accept, and Styrofoam, which has no reuse, as of current conditions. Glass, including containers, drinking and cups, plates and baking dishes, has no current market in our area and is being landfilled on site.

We collected 109 units of household hazardous waste from our member towns during June 2015. Used motor oil is accepted by many local garages. A new point collection program, including latex, has been established at our transfer station. This will allow disposal year-round and recycles usable point via an outside contractor.

Universal waste such as fluorescent lamps, mercury thermometers and switches, TV's, computer equipment, etc. must also be separated from regular waste and brought to the designated spot at the Recycling and Transfer Station, Route 2, Mexico.

The Dixfield Historical Society has once again experienced great community support in 2015. Several artifacts and many archival materials have been donated, and we in the organization are so grateful that interested citizens want Dixfield's history to be preserved for future generations and not lost to boxes deteriorating in an attic, basement, or closet somewhere.

We continue to work with the Maine Memory Network and Maine Archives and Museums for preservation and further education projects. Kurt Rowley's class "A River Valley Civilization" from Dirigo High School sponsored a Silent Movie Night at the Tuscan Opera House for the third straight year and donated the proceeds of \$309.75 to the Society. A big thank you to them for this community outreach project and to Nancy Carpenter for making the building available for the event.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Dixfield, Maine as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Dixfield, Maine as of June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 11 and 43 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Dixfield, Maine's basic financial statements. The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

JUNE 30, 2015

(UNAUDITED)

The following management's discussion and analysis of Town of Dixfield, Maine's financial performance provides an overview of the Town's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015. Please read it in conjunction with the Town's financial statements.

Financial Statement Overview

The Town of Dixfield, Maine's basic financial statements include the following components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also includes required supplementary information which consists of the general fund budgetary comparison schedule, and other supplementary information which includes combining and other schedules.

Basic Financial Statements

The basic financial statements include financial information in two differing views: the government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements. These basic financial statements also include the notes to financial statements that explain in more detail certain information in the financial statements and also provide the user with the accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements provide a broad view of the Town's operations in a manner that is similar to private businesses. These statements provide both short-term as well as long-term information in regards to the Town's financial position. These financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. This measurement focus takes into account all revenues and expenses associated with the fiscal year regardless of when cash is received or paid. The government-wide financial statements include the following two statements:

The Statement of Net Position – this statement presents *all* of the government's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources with the difference being reported as net position.

The Statement of Activities – this statement presents information that shows how the government's net position changed during the period. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows.

Both of the above mentioned financial statements have separate columns for the two different types of town activities. The types of activities presented for the Town of Dixfield are:

- *Governmental activities* – The activities in this section are mostly supported by taxes and inter governmental revenues (federal and state grants). Most of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental activities, which include general government, protection, public works, human services, education, community and social agencies, and unclassified.
- *Business-type activities* – These activities are normally intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and / or charges to external users for goods and/or services. These activities for the Town of Dixfield include the sewer and water departments.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town of Dixfield, Maine, like other local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with financial related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Town of Dixfield, Maine can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and proprietary funds.

Governmental funds: Most of the basic services provided by the Town are financed through governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported in governmental activities in the government- wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, the governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources. They also focus on the balance of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information will be useful in evaluating the government's near-term financing requirements. This approach is known as the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this approach revenues are recorded when cash is received or when susceptible to accrual. Expenditures are recorded when liabilities are incurred and due. These statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's finances to assist in determining whether there will be adequate financial resources available to meet the current needs of the Town.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities. These reconciliations are presented on the page immediately following each governmental fund financial statement.

The Town of Dixfield, Maine presents five columns in the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances. The Town's major governmental funds are the general fund, the Road Reconstruction Fund, the Lone Harlow Community Fund and the Lone Harlow Scholarship Fund. All other funds are shown as nonmajor and are combined in the "All Nonmajor Funds" column on these statements.

The general fund is the only fund for which the Town legally adopted a budget. The Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budgetary Basis – Budget and Actual – General Fund provides a comparison of the original and final budget and the actual expenditures for the current year.

Proprietary Funds: The Town of Dixfield, Maine maintains two proprietary funds, the sewer and water departments. These funds are used to show activities that operate more like those of commercial enterprises. Proprietary funds provide the same type of information as the government-wide financial statements, only in more detail. Like the government-wide financial statements, proprietary fund financial statements use the accrual basis of accounting. No reconciliation is needed between the government-wide financial statements for business-type activities and the proprietary fund financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the Government-Wide and the Fund Financial Statements. The Notes to Financial Statements can be found following the Statement of Cash Flows – Proprietary Funds.

Required Supplementary Information

The basic financial statements are followed by a section of required supplementary information, which includes a Budgetary Comparison Schedule – Budgetary Basis – Budget and Actual – General Fund.

Other Supplementary Information

Other supplementary information follows the required supplementary information. These combining and other schedules provide information in regards to nonmajor funds, capital asset activity and other detailed budgetary information for the general fund.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

Our analysis below focuses on the net position, and changes in net position of the Town's governmental and business-type activities. The Town's total net position for governmental activities decreased by \$178,964 from \$13.44 million to \$13.26 million. The Town's total net position for business-type activities decreased by \$147,609 from \$3.17 million to \$3.02 million.

Unrestricted net position - the part of net position that can be used to finance day-to-day operations without constraints established by debt covenants, enabling legislation, or other legal requirements - increased for governmental activities to a balance of \$1,561,994 at the end of this year. Unrestricted net position for business-type activities decreased to a balance of \$68,020.

Revenues and Expenses

Revenues for the Town's governmental activities increased by 1.70%, while total expenses increased by 5.42%. For the business-type activities revenues decreased by 3.74%, while total expenses increased by 12.63%.

Financial Analysis of the Town's Fund Statements

Governmental funds: The financial reporting focus of the Town's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information may be useful in assessing the Town's financial requirements. In particular, unassigned fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's financial position at the end of the year, and the net resources available for spending.

The general fund total fund balance increased by \$113,909 over the prior fiscal year. The Road Reconstruction Fund total fund balance decreased by \$158,555 from the prior fiscal year. The Ione Harlow Community Fund total fund balance increased by

\$2,596 from the prior fiscal year. The lone Harlow Scholarship Fund total fund balance increased by \$1,175 from the prior fiscal year. The non-major fund balances increased by \$26,775 from the prior fiscal year.

Proprietary funds: The Town's proprietary funds provide the same type of information found in the government-wide financial statements, but in more detail.

The sewer department had a change in net position of (\$188,966) for the year ended June 30, 2015. The water department had a change in net position of \$41,357 for the current year.

Budgetary Highlights

There was no significant difference between the original and final budget for the general fund.

The general fund actual revenues were over budget by \$21,839. This was mainly the result of excess receipts in all categories except property taxes, homestead exemption, and other intergovernmental revenues.

The general fund actual expenditures were under the budget by \$219,567. All expenditure categories were under budget.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2015, the net book value of capital assets recorded by the Town increased by \$381,036 from the prior year. The increase is the result of current year additions of \$966,274 less current year depreciation expense of \$585,238.

At June 30, 2015, the Town had \$2,606,154 in bonds outstanding versus \$2,729,542 last year. Other obligations include capital leases payable and accrued sick and vacation time. Refer to Note 6 of Notes to Financial Statements for more detailed information.

The Town has steadily maintained a sufficient unassigned fund balance to sustain government operations for a period of approximately two months, while also maintaining significant reserve accounts for future capital and program needs.

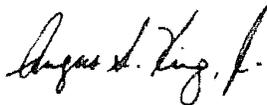
